When George Washington was a teenager, he joined the Virginia militia in the French and Indian War. This war was fought between the British and the French over land in North America. The Native Americans joined the French in the fight because they were afraid that the British would take over their land. George Washington was fighting on the side of the British. This was before the colonists needed freedom from Great Britain. It wasn't until after the British won the French and Indian War that King George III began to treat the colonists unfairly. He began imposing taxes and laws that the Americans found to be unjust.


George Washington, along with delegates from the other colonies, met at the Continental Congress and decided to fight the British together. In May of 1775, Congress chose Washington to be the General of the Continental Army. He had a tough job, as most of the soldiers had no experience in the army. They were just farmers going up against the world's greatest military. There were times when many of the American soldiers wanted to give up, but Washington encouraged them and remained by their side through the losing battles and the bad conditions they sometimes faced. He proved to the soldiers that he was trustworthy and they knew they could count on him. He led them to victory over the British.

Washington served two terms as President of the United States. He only made executive decisions that would unite the country, like constructing roads between states and building post offices. He stepped down after serving eight years because he didn't want to rule too long, like a king.
